In 1979 this property was acquired by Baron Edmond de Rothschild who already owned the neighboring estates: Châteaux Clarke and Malmaison. It marked the beginning of a new era, starting with the complete restructuring of the vineyard and restoration of the buildings.


Château Odilon is now overseen by Ariane de Rothschild and Domaines Barons de Rothschild

Lafite has been taking care of the distribution since 1993.

Previously named Château Peyre-Lebade based on its geographical location, the estate has been renamed Château Odilon, in honor of painter Odilon Redon who spent his childhood and most of its active life on the property. His most famous paintings have been inspired by the bucolic landscapes of the Médoc, scattered with moor and marshlands.

- · Château Odilon is now overseen by Ariane de Rothschild.
- The vineyard is looked after by the same team as Château Clarke and Malmaison and cover 136 acres of limestone and claylimestone soils
- The vineyard is planted with a majority of merlot, which is quite unique in the Médoc.
- Cultivation methods remain traditional with grass cover between the rows. Leaf-thinning and green harvesting are carried out throughout the vineyard in order to achieve optimal levels of ripeness and concentration in the grapes.

- 85% Merlot, 15% Cabernet Sauvignon
- Château Odilon is overseen by Ariane de Rothschild and Domaines Barons de Rothschild Lafite has been taking care of the distribution since 1993

 Vineyards cover 136 acres of limestone and claylimestone soils- majority planted to Merlot which is unique in the Médoc

- The proximity of the vineyards to the Atlantic ocean brings an element of freshness that is reflected in the bright, fresh aromatic style of the wine
- Average vine age is 30 years
- This wine has remarkable elegance and its length suggests an excellent potential to age
